During that time, hundreds of children have been rescued from the streets and other dire circumstances. Many teens have also received life changing discipleship and vocational training through the years. It gives us great joy to share some of the stories we have received from India:



Gowtham: She was born into a lower caste tribal family and was raised to worship pagan gods. Ten years ago her father was in an accident which left him unable to walk. Pastor Lazar visited the home and prayed for her father and he was miraculously healed. Following his healing, the entire family came to accept Jesus as Savior and live for Christ.

Gowtham, now eighteen years of age, has completed her first year of nursing vocational training. She continues her studies at the Feed My People campus.



Vemula: He was born into a Hindu family. When he was four years old, his parents were in an automobile accident, resulting in his mother’s death and father losing both legs. Incapacitated, his father could no longer work and support him. His grandmother brought him to the orphanage where he learned of Christ’s love for him.

He is now ten years old and in the 4th grade. He likes to read his Bible, attend church and pray.

Sandya: Sandya was raised in the Feed My People Orphanage. After completing high school she continued in nursing vocational school. She has been working at a private hospital since that time. She was recently married and continues to live for Christ. Reverend Thomas stated, *“This girl was sponsored by you from her childhood. Your sacrificial financial support has enabled her to enjoy a good Christian life.”*



Vinay: He was born into a Hindu family, but was disobedient as a child. After being dismissed from school for stealing, he ran away from home and lived on the streets for three years. The police brought him to the Tenali orphanage where he has lived for the past five years. He is now a Christian and serving the Lord. He completed tenth grade this year and is in vocational

school studying to be a lab technician.

Wanchai was a former Buddhist priest who has spent his life winning others to Christ and discipling them. For most of those years they ran a boarding school program to reach young girls from hill tribes in danger of being trafficked. Hundreds of teens and adults have come to know Christ as Savior through his ministry.

Last year they learned the house and building they used as a church for many years was badly damaged and in need of replacing. Support from a number of donors, enabled them to build a beautiful new church. Wanchai recently sent pictures to show several of the new believers that are now attending the church.
